Best of Family Winemakers of California

On August 13 the Family Winemakers of California held their second ever tasting in Oakland. It is one of my favorite wine events of the year. Many of the people pouring the wine have the same name on their nametags as the name on the wine label. There is a warmth, and yes, love for the wines that you do not find at the more "corporate" wine events.

The span of different grape varietals was intriguing. Like to taste a Semillon or a Barbera? How about Tempranillo or Alicante Bouchet? Come on in, they're all here.

I was never really able to find out exactly what constitutes a "family winemaker." The vast majority of the wineries seemed to span the spectrum from small mom and pop operations to small/medium size operations making under 10,000 cases per year.

With the help of fellow wine and food writer Ittai Shui I meandered through the table-filled venue, focusing on small wineries with which I was unfamiliar. There were so many great wines at the tasting – literally hundreds. The following list catalogues the wines that stood out among a huge sea of also-rans. They are wines of great character and quality and are worth searching out. They show that some of the finest wines of the state are created in small, relatively little known, out of the way places by wineries fueled by family love and devotion.

• 2013 Viluko Cabernet Sauvignon (BEST VALUE)

Usually, Cabernet Sauvignon poured at wine tasting is often way too young and green to be appealing. So, I was delighted to come across this 10-year old bottling from the Mayacamas Mountain area. The nose opens with profound notions of blueberry preserves, tapenade and earth. Medium-bodied rich ripe and concentrated, it has solid structure and exquisite balance finishing long and perfumed. At \$50 on their website, this is one of the best deals available in Napa & Sonoma Cabernet.

• 2021 DePeche Scarpatta Aglianico

What a delightful surprise to come across a California Aglianico. Grown along a dry escarp-



ment in San Benito County, this rare wine is immediately charming. The nose is perfumed and floral and the wines' body slight and refreshing. Like a great Beaujolais, it is lively and vibrant in the mouth and immensely satisfying. Drink slightly chilled with a plate of prosciutto and melon.

• 2021 T. Berkeley Ophelia Cabernet Franc

This is a beautiful rendition of Cabernet Franc, with dark, brooding blueberry and blackberry fruit, some forest floor and floral notes, a dense purple color and soft, silky tannins. Medium to full-bodied, this is a big juicy, complex wine with good richness and intensity. Should have many good years ahead of itself in the cellar.

• 2018 Elaine Chardonnay Calypte Vineyard

The 2018 Elaine Chardonnay offers lush aromas of peaches, saline, hazelnuts and notes of dried flowers. In the mouth, it has a medium weight, ultra-silky texture and expansive flavors, framed by delicious juiciness and a long, long finish.



• 2018 Intent Syrah Odyssey Vineyard

This micro-cuvee (86 cases) from the Russian River Valley has a deep ruby-purple color and classic aromas of cassis, black pepper, blackberry, chocolate, tar and anise. Full-bodied and powerful with rounded tannins, it has good freshness but is still tightly coiled on the finish. Should improve for at least a decade in the cellar.

• 2020 Starfield Cinsault

Cinsault is a lesser-known blending grape used in the south of France and it's nice to see it highlighted in this El Dorado County bottling. It has a charming floral nose that jumps from the glass with hints of blueberries and raspberries. In the mouth there is a gusher of round voluptuous fruit followed by fresh juicy acid, finishing clean and vibrant. I would drink this delightful wine slightly chilled on a warm afternoon.

• 2021 Gondak Grenache

This Russian River Grenache pours a brilliant fuschia in the glass and leads aromatically with raspberries, earth, tobacco and a hint of black olives. In the mouth, the tannins are wrapped around a core of pure raspberry fruit. It is ripe but not overly so and features a constellation of soft, chalky tannins. Really nicely done.



2022 Field Gewurztraminer "I'orange"

I am a huge orange wine fan as well as a Gewurztraminer aficionado, so to see them combined was exciting. Fifteen days of skin contact during fermentation gives the wine a lovely golden/orange hue. Lush and piquant on the palate, with great intensity and beautiful bitters reminiscent of bitter oranges on the finish, this is a rich, tensioned, and vital Gewurtz that is immensely satisfying. I would drink by itself on the porch or deck on a warm afternoon.

• 2021 Sir Ras Syrah Bennett Valley

Produced by the Box Wine Company of Sebastopol, this is brooding and dark with notes of blackberry, anise, tobacco and black pepper. In the mouth, the tannins create a framework within which the fruit is coiled, and it slowly unfurls through the long finish. Tannic and extraordinarily fresh, this finishes with a spicy elegance.

• 2019 Nove Grenache

This is not the first time this Lake County Grenache has landed in the top of the Family Winemakers group. It offers a cherry core, with a pleasing dusty mineral essence, hints of wild herbs, sage and red fruit that shines with purity and finesse. Medium-bodied, the generously-layered Grenache unwinds on the palate to reveal juicy red fruit tones, delicate mineral tension and a slightly spicy note on the finish.

• 2021 Sojourn Pinot Noir Sangiacomo Vineyard

This lovely wine hails from the Sonoma Coast AVA. It has a generous, broody perfume of strawberry jam, tobacco, forest floor and earth. The palate is concentrated, chalky and refreshing with a striking blend of ripe fruit and earthy character and a long, perfumed finish. Perfect with grilled salmon steaks.

• 2019 Kendric Syrah Petaluma Gap

Instantly impressive, the Kendric Syrah is rich, round and mineral-driven with aromas of black pepper, flowers and blackberries with a touch of plum preserves. Full-bodied and generously layered, the Syrah fills the mouth revealing impressive complexity within a frame of fine-grained tannins that elevate the long savory finish. Delicious juice. 175 cases produced.

This new Lodi-based winery's Cabernet shows black and red fruits with oak aromas and mineral essence. The wine displays hints of graphite with a touch of blackberry jam. Full-bodied and displaying fine-grained tannins, the Cabernet will remain food-friendly for about five more years. It ends with a spicy, mineral-laced finish.

2022 Puppione Family Festa

One of the things I love about the Family Winemakers tasting is that you always come across some nice surprises and this was one of them. Made from the rare Northern Italian grape of Friulano sourced from a vineyard in the Sierra foothills, this refreshing wine is immediately beguiling. Fresh, tart, zippy and uplifting this zings across the palate and finishes clean and savory. It cries out for fresh oysters or seafood.

2018 Greyscale Stage 1

A blend of 82% Cabernet Sauvignon, 15% Merlot and 3% Mal-

bec this Bordeaux style blend is from the Atlas Peak AVA. This offers up a boisterous bouquet of cassis, loamy soil, smoke and spices. Medium to full-bodied, seamless and fleshy, it's beautifully balanced, with a generous core of fruit, soft tannins and lively acids. Great job.

• 2018 Noceto Fumo E Terra Aglianico

I love the Taurasi Italian wines made from the Aglianico grape, so I was delighted to see this Sierra Foothills producer trying their hand at the grape. The wine offers impressive complexity with a long succession of aromas including cranberries, smoke, and baking spice. The bouquet is also heavy on bramble and forest floor. The wine shows robust fruit and balanced oak spice. The tannins are well managed, and it should last in the cellar for over a decade.

• 2018 Bella Grace 1646

This red blend is made from Barbera, Zinfandel, Primitivo and Petite Sirah and named for the elevation of the wine estate. It has a medium ruby-purple color and gregarious scents of peach, wild berry preserves, orange peel and tar. The palate is deeply fruited but light on its feet with bright freshness and loads of perfume on the long finish. Great partner to grilled burgers.

2020 Anarchist Freudian Slip Superego Blend

What a totally unusual blend! 78% Nebbiolo mixed with Pinot Noir, Cabernet Franc and 4 other wines. The Freudian Slip is plump and juicy with immediate and ripe fruit flavors. You get strawberry, roses and raspberry with earth and cherries. The wine puts its primary aromas first, but with time in the glass, the wine unwinds to more nuanced Nebbiolo tones of leather and earth.

2020 Monroy Cabernet Sauvignon

This is my second opportunity to taste this outstanding Cabernet from the Chalk Hill AVA. It has a beautiful blueberry/blackberry nose with a hint of oak. It is full and round on the palate with just the perfect amount of tannins on the lingering finish. Would be a great partner to a grilled ribeye
